

85 Years of Healing


Abbott House has been serving South Dakota children for more than 85 years. Here, kids find hope and healing after living through some of the worst trauma imaginable. They have experienced abuse, neglect, mental health issues, and more. Abbott House is where these children come to find hope, healing, and family.

Abbott House started in 1939 as a home for boys and girls whose families were struggling or couldn't support them. Since then, we have continued to grow and evolve to better serve South Dakota youth. Today, we operate a Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility (PRTF) for girls ages 7-17. In addition, we own and operate ten Therapeutic Foster Homes across the state, serving both boys and girls up to age 18, and sixteen Independent Living Apartments for young people, ages 16-21, who are aging out of foster care.

In our PRTF program, we serve roughly 60-80 young girls every year. Many of the youth coming through our doors share similar stories of mental health struggles, abuse, neglect, drug and alcohol addiction, and other forms of trauma. Each child responds to these traumatic events differently – which means their treatment must also be unique. Abbott House provides individualized treatment plans for every child using advanced and empirically proven techniques.

In all Abbott House programs, staff are trained to work specifically with traumatized youth. Our philosophy is that children participate in troubled behaviors due to internal trauma that can be healed with patience and support. By implementing trauma-informed care, our staff can safely and effectively handle our youth's trauma responses.

Children are referred to Abbott House through numerous different ways. The most common referrals come from parents, extended family members, and the South Dakota Department of Social Services. While not as common, other referrals can come from Department of Corrections, Tribal Leaders, schools, and churches.



### Accommodating Sensory Needs

There are many moving parts of the Abbott House program that lead our children to success. While in our Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility, girls attend traditional therapy sessions twice a week. In addition, they participate in numerous other forms of therapy, which are assigned to them based on their individual needs. Some of these therapies include

Neurofeedback, Mood Management, Nurture Groups, Sexual Abuse Group, Grief Group, Independent Living Skills, and many others. These group therapies are led by our five fully licensed therapists.

Another approach Abbott
House has taken in trauma
treatment is the use of sensory
tools. Abbott House employs
one Sensory Coordinator and
two Sensory Assistants. Our
Sensory Coordinator works with
our youth at admittance to develop

a personalized "Sensory Diet". This plan outlines our children's sensory needs, such as noise-avoidance or sensory-seeking, as well as what sensory tools and activities can help that specific child manage their emotions before reaching crisis situations. The Sensory Assistants spend their days working one-on-one with our young people, encouraging them to engage in their Sensory Diets throughout the day and taking them to spend time in our newly renovated Sensory Room.

The Abbott House Sensory Team has made major impacts on the children in our care. Since expanding this department to include three individuals, our children have had increased access to sensory tools and activities because there is a Sensory Team member working every single day and into the evening. Since bringing on these two sensory assistants, Abbott House has provided more Sensory Sessions in one year than it ever has before!



# Overcoming Trauma with Education


Most young people arrive at the Abbott House two to four years behind in their education. It is our goal to help them become successful and catch up on the education they have missed.

The Abbott House school is part of the Mitchell School District and has certified teachers. Our three classrooms, located inside Abbott House, are built to serve young people who have not been successful in school in the past. Each classroom has 6-14 students with a teacher and aides to help provide individualized attention. Varied seating options, dimmable lighting, sensory safe rugs, noise cancelling headphones, and more sensory options are all available to our students to help them focus.

#### During the 2024 school year:

- 26 (41%) Abbott House girls had an Individual Education Plan (IEP) or a 504 Plan.
- Girls at the Abbott House PRTF program earned 129.5 high school credits.
- 3 girls graduated from high school or received their GED while in PRTF.

When I was 17 years old, I entered the Vyas Family Bridges home feeling lost, confused, and deeply hurt by everything I had been through that past year. While at the home, I learned valuable coping techniques, how to navigate daily life, and, most importantly, how to love life again. The support and guidance I received there shaped me into the person I am today, allowing me to find success in my life and career. Now, I am happily married with a beautiful baby boy, and severely grateful for the foundation the Abbott House foster parents helped me build.

#### **Creating Opportunities** for Homeless Youth

There are more than 1,100 children in foster care in South Dakota and only 835 foster families. Many of these children are over 10 years old and/or part of a sibling group, which can make it more challenging to find a foster family who can support them. To combat this, Abbott House has been creating foster homes for boys and girls up to the age of 18. The Bridges Therapeutic Foster Care Program provides a family and a safe place for young people who have nowhere else to go. Each home can hold up to six young people. In FY 2024, Abbott House began expanding its Bridges Foster Care program to Sioux Falls with a \$2 million capital campaign. These Sioux Falls foster homes opened after FY 2024 ended and thus, will be included in reports next year. These additional homes provide foster children across South Dakota with the opportunity to be closer to family and friends and grow up in a safe, supportive family environment.

#### Creating Opportunities for Homeless Young Adults

Young adults need support and guidance when transitioning from adolescence to adulthood. For foster care children with no family to turn to, that transition can be challenging. That is why Abbott House offers the Larson Independent Living Program for young adults aged 18 to 21 who are aging out of foster care. Through our program, these barely legal adults have access to a safe low-cost apartment environment and a supportive network of staff. The clients in these apartments are required to meet with the program coordinator weekly, obtain employment or pursue secondary education (or both), and actively participate in the program to develop and enhance independent living skills. When they are ready to move out, the rent collected from these young adults is returned to them in hopes it is used to alleviate financial stress while transitioning into a fully independent lifestyle.

Abbott House provides 16 apartments and independent living support services for young people transitioning from the foster care system. We accept young adults from both our own program and the state's foster care program. Eight of the apartments are in Mitchell and eight are located in Rapid City.

In FY 24, 23 young adults were served in the Larson Independent Living Program. = 15 Rapid City = 8 Mitchell


## **2024 Highlights**


